1. Does Present-Day English have the same capacity to create self-explaining compounds as Old English did?
2. What is the origin of Historical Linguistics?
3. What German dialect has established itself as the literary language of Germany?
4. Explain the evolution of the presence of the Normans of the lower classes in England in the eleventh and twelfth centuries.
5. Which of the Old English dialects attained the position of a literary standard?

Glossary:

hundes: Singular genitive case ‘of the hound’.

fordo: Past participle of *fordon* ‘destroyed’.

not: ne wat: 3rd singular present indicative of *witen* ‘to know’, negative form.

imeinde: Past participle of *mengen* ‘mixed’.

smak: ‘scent’.

auorþ: forward.

abak: back.

mist: 3rd singular preterit indicative of *missen* ‘to miss’, ‘to fail’.

dwole: ‘tricks’.

cropp: 3rd singular present indicative of *crope* ‘to creep’.

napeles: Conjunction introducing an adversative coordinate clause ‘nevertheless’.

wrenche: ‘tricks’.

biþenche: Infinitive ‘to expect’.

þe3: Subordinating conjunction introducing an adverb clause of concession ‘although’.

bo: 3rd singular present subjunctive of *ben* ‘be’.

3ep: ‘vigorous’, ‘cunning’.

suþe: ‘greatly’.

snel: ‘active’, ‘quick’.

vel: ‘fur’.
